The students used paper plates, string, beads, feathers and markers to create their work of art. This was a highly engaging, exciting project. Next, they will be looking at designing drums and making bannock.

Recently, the Grade 6 class had to become crime scene investigators, in order to solve the mystery of who took the stuffing out of Mr. Bearamy! Our science lab was transformed into a crime scene, equipped with a variety of stations where the students had to examine fingerprints, sort through clues, and inspect the evidence. We are happy to report that the Grade 6 detectives worked hard to solve this mystery, the criminal mastermind that de-stuffed Mr. Bearamy was caught, and this case was put to rest.

In our latest Response to Intervention (RTI) cycle, junior high teachers brought forth some big changes. During our six week RTI block, they created a school newspaper, extension project for those students not needing RTI assistance. With the help and guidance of their teacher, the junior high students started a bi-weekly newsletter. This project not only helped students improve their writing, it allowed them to focus on current events in our school as well as larger scale events happening in the world. Every couple of weeks, the students turned in their topic ideas to their teacher. From there, they would do the necessary research to write their article. Then they would write the article and together with their peers work on their editing skills. Once approved, they typed up their article and worked together on formatting it nicely into a newspaper. It was a great addition to our school news and allowed our junior high to have a voice.
