- Less money for TA's

- Split classes only work for some
- If you don't like the teacher you have
- Evergreen modernization

- I SEE SOME OF THE CHALLENGES BEING:
- Large groups or 'cliques'
- Not knowing all students and/or staff
- Larger staff
- Too many children to be supervised more bullying will happen
- Students will become a number
- Students will get lost
- Not a family feeling (3)
- Relationships within the school with a larger population
- Too many kids (2), lose that closeness and family friendly feel
- Less extra events, too much for parent volunteers to do
- Large/bigger class sizes (2)
- More issues for those kids that might feel overwhelmed by large crowds
- Multiple classroom choices re: teachers
- Harder to get to know everyone
- More bussing issues
- My concern with this many kids is safety and the teachers knowing all the students would be a concern as well. What about parent after-school pickup and morning drop off? That will be crazy. It is just hard to imagine such big numbers at this young age.
- More kids=more staff
- 450 in K-6 WAY TOO big (not as personal)
- Teachers only know 2/3 of kids/a family not all 100% from experience
- I think this idea is awful: community involvement, safety, family feel all gone!
- How do you deal with bussing because this road is so busy (not talking length of time on bus but how to house this many busses) and all the parent pick ups(how to organize this)
- I have huge issues; I think our kids will suffer, not in the class-

- A new clean school would be great
- New building=people will choose to go here because it is new(not at all a reason for my family)
- No need to modernize Evergreen
- Bus lanes and parking are sub-standard at all the existing primary schools in Edson. Hope would be in safety and ease of use would be in the forefront when planning the new facility- this is your chance to do it right
- Starting fresh with proper/safe bus lanes and parking
- It only makes sense to move forward, initial cost is high but there isn't any benefit to trying to maintain two very old schools
- A brand new school would be a huge selling point when trying to attract new people to townas well as attracting new teachers looking for employment.

- Possible decrease in PAC functions due to logistics, costs and the increase in parent helpers required but not received. Traffic at pickup time not manageable-buses and cars make it too congest-ed-will need a well thought out bus land and parking lot. Neighbours to school? Are we going to see an increase in taxes/Or does that increase anyways with the building of a new school no matter the size? Loss of more green space/playground space. Students are resilient but I forsee some students not transitioning very well to a bigger school. It's manageable but stressful. (*received by email*)
