Happy Spring! The month of May will be filled with many exciting learning opportunities for our students. We begin with Education Week and the Screen-Free Challenge from April 29th to May 3rd. During Education Week, Grade 2 and 3 classes will attend the 75th anniversary of D-Day commemorative event at the Jasper Railway Station, Grade 5 students will participate in safety patrol training, and Grade 6 students will study the science of trees and forests at the Palisades on May 3rd. May 6-10 is Mental Health Awareness Week. Daily lunchtime activities will include board games, crafts, stories, and yoga for students. Canadian author Wendy McLeod MacKnight will also visit our Grade 4-6 classes on May 13th.

At this time of year, it is exciting to see how all of our students have grown. We appreciate your support in student learning and growth; parent volunteers are an important pillar in our ability to provide extracurricular activities and field trips for our students. As an extension to the science unit on crime and investigation, Grade 6 students participated in a program provided through Stewardship Education Centre at the Palisades.



The program started with an introduction to wildlife forensic analysis where students learned about basic investigation skills required for enforcement of the National Parks Act. Parks Canada educators presented possible poaching scenarios and then invited the students to work collaboratively to collect, catalogue, map, and analyze evidence found at the "crime scene". The role of each student was clearly defined: photographer, evidence collector, scribe, security, or investigation leader - just like in real life.

Each team then met with Parks' facilitators and outlined the progress of their investigation before presenting the case in "court". It was a delight to see students joining the puzzle pieces together and build their case. The most interesting part of the program was the forensics lab where samples found in the field were brought to be analyzed - 'What can a bottle tell about a potential crime suspect or a receipt found in a bush?' 'What about the bullet shells on the ground, or the footprint in the mud...how can one find the right suspect?' Fingerprints, DNA samples, and other evidence collected were analyzed in the lab in order to narrow down the list of possible suspects.

"It was fun to work in teams and solve a crime. We were out in the field and we got to do the job of a park warden, that was really cool!" said one student.

Thanks to our Grade 6 teachers, Camelia Bejenaru and Sara Kongsrud, for organizing this opportunity and upcoming field trip opportunities for the students. With hands-on experiential learning, student engagement and participation are guarantees; teamwork and communication skills are a must! Upcoming field trips for the Grade 6 classes include a trees and forests session at the Palisades on May 3rd, and an overnight trip in May to Edmonton to visit the Legislature building and TELUS World of Science.
